

New Co-Worker

Remember that new employees are nervous to begin with; Even if they have worked for us before, starting a new job can be stressful and intimidating.

They might not remember all the instructions they are given and probably aren't familiar with their new surroundings.

This is often a time for information overload.

How can you help as an experienced worker?

- Introduce the people he or she will be working with show them around.
- Encourage them to ask questions if he or she is not sure about something. It can be hard to admit that you don't know exactly what you are doing, since it's a new situation with new surroundings.
- Remember that the new worker may be highly skilled and experienced in his or her trade, but not necessarily used to the terminology or company's policies and ways of doing things.
- Point out locations of first aid kits, fire extinguishers, restrooms, break rooms, and job posting.
- Be sure the new workers has the proper PPE's and is using it correctly.
- If you spot the new worker doing something unsafe, tactfully explain the proper procedures.
- Most importantly, Lead by example with safe and correct work habits.

Be aware of potential dangers and point them out in case they don't notice the danger.
